I am looking forward to attending the National Garden Club board meeting in September in St Louis with our new Region Director Betty Cookendorfer, and the new State Presidents in

in our Central Atlantic Region. I hope that we gather safely and learn from each other.

We had our first State meeting since November 2019 via zoom on June 19, 2021. We had a program provided by Kirk Brown respective to the 200th

anniversary of Frederick Law Olmsted’s birth. Zoom is definitely a fabulous tool to have! Thankfully most of our clubs will be meeting in person soon. I’m excited to say that we have scheduled an in person State meeting with special guest NGC President Mary Warshauer for this November. Although a lot of clubs have not met for meetings they have continued their outside projects.

My President’s Project is **Grow Locally** and is offering small grants to help clubs “Grow” in their community. Briefly, clubs are encouraged to

- Grow membership: Engage a special speaker, hold workshops, place notices and flyers about with meeting information
- Grow awareness: Print brochures, place signage at outdoor projects, rent a table at a local event, give away a plant or seed packet with club information

- Grow a garden: Create a new garden, revitalize an old garden, create a container garden, place arrangements in public buildings

My President’s project was announced at the June Zoom meeting. Hardcopies of the descriptive flyer were mailed to each Club President. Three clubs have already applied and have received checks to “Grow Locally”.

Update on some of our Club’s activities and plans:

The Salt Air Gardeners have big plans for early October. We will be hosting a free outdoor concert to celebrate our five year anniversary and also to raise funds for a Blue Star Memorial to be located in Ocean View, DE. The town of Ocean View is generously procuring a suitable site and assisting with physical and financial support.

Despite the pandemic, the Spade & Trowel Garden Club of Seaford, Delaware, held its annual greens sale in December, accepting orders from previous customers only. The club sold 181 evergreen products including 83 cemetery mounds, all constructed and delivered safely in just two days.

Although not holding meetings, members volunteered to plant the flower baskets on two bridges downtown. Several containers also were planted at City Hall and for businesses around town.



Brandywine Garden Club supports our local community by planting & maintaining a Children’s Garden at the Brandywine Hundred Library. Incorporated throughout the perennials & annuals are painted stones depicting various children’s books as well as bird houses & feeders for our feathered friends.

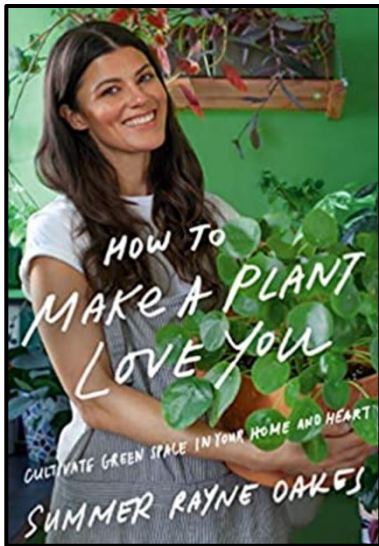

ZOOM – Remember when that word made you think of fast cars...the last year changed that. ZOOM is the webcasting platform that many of our garden clubs used to conduct their meetings and stay in touch with their members.

By March, Maryland’s infection rates were low which allowed us to hold our Annual Meeting in March. At that time not all members had been vaccinated so we held a hybrid meeting, with members participating live and via Zoom. Our presenter, Summer Rayne Oakes is an author, popular Media Influencer and environmental activist.



Summer Rayne Oakes was reclaiming mine sites, researching sewage sludge, and restoring forestlands when she was struck with the idea that style—and how we live our life—would be a far more effective means to connect people to the natural world. Graduating Cornell University cum laude with degrees in Environmental Science and Entomology, Oakes began to bridge her interest in ecological systems to industries that affect our everyday life—from what we wear to what we eat. This journey has led her to two decades of experience infusing sustainable-thinking and practices into the heart of the fashion, beauty and food industries. Most recently Oakes has been focused on sustainable food, agricultural, and horticultural systems and our connection to what we grow and what we eat.

Maryland was also able to hold two live schools in April: Landscape Design Course II and Flower Show School Course IV. Strict Social Distancing and COVID protocols were observed at all sessions.

We have always had an active Horticulture Committee. Former Chair Sue Christiansen introduced a publication titled “Tall Weeds” filled with informative articles and “how-to’s”. The tradition continues with our new Horticulture Chairs, Terry Holman and Maureen Rice. In the first issue they announced a Phenology Project.

Phenology is the study of cyclic and seasonal natural phenomena in relation to climate, plant, and animal life.

They are asking Club members to serve as novice Phenologists to observe their town’s horticulture for the dates of first, mid and late blooming or interest for specific plants. Terry says “From this data, we can begin to trend Maryland dates for plants bloom/ interest periods and can graphically share this information to better identify a “best guess” date range to feature specific plant blooms/interests for your standard flower show schedules or to plan out bloom succession more accurately for your landscaping projects in our changing climates.” This may be a project for your State.

In closing, we will never forget the year of COVID. Hats off to the many club members and Officers whose creativity and perseverance kept their club members engaged.

Many transitions are taking place in the National Capital Area Garden Clubs during the summer of 2021. We have a new NCAGC board, four new district directors and many new club presidents. We are also figuring out how to transition from our year of virtual meetings to hybrid and in person meetings. We have learned that when scheduling meetings, we are considering not only the calendar but also the CDC and our local health department websites for guidance. As places start to open, we have noticed that some of our meeting locations are no longer allowing us to meet there. During these times we’ve realized the importance of communication. We want to know what others are doing and how they are handling these new obstacles. In working with my communications team, we have decided to implement some additional forms of communication. As a board, we are using Google Workspace for our email, Google Meet, and Google Drive storage and sharing. We hope this will improve communications and help

with smooth transitions in the future. We are starting a monthly Zoom meeting with club presidents and a monthly informational newsletter.

Not everything was virtual in the spring. NCAGC held a Flower Show School in March to complete the four course series and we now have six student judges. Working with a local golf club, we were able to hold a hybrid installation for the NCAGC officers. With our masks, social distancing, and some outdoor space we were able to get together – for many the first time in a year. Clubs installed officers and held outdoor celebrations.

With all our new student judges, clubs and districts have been planning and holding flower shows. My club holds a summer flower show at our county fair, and I know of other clubs holding shows in member’s homes. NCAGC District IV has a Flower Show planned in September.

We were fortunate to have as our speaker for this event, Dr. Margaret Lowman, also known as "Canopy Meg". She is a world-renowned arborist, author, speaker and educator who refers to herself as an "arbornaut". Dr. Lowman climbs to the top of the tree canopy around the globe to fulfill her mission to explore, research and conserve our planet's forests. She is an inspiring pioneer in her field.

I was honored to be installed as the 50th President of the Garden Club of New Jersey. The theme of my presidency is "Plant Trees: Nature's Unsung Heroes". According to Doug Tallamy, author, professor and respected conservation advocate, "we have removed more than half of the forests on earth". We are losing trees at an alarming rate to commercial agriculture, wildfires, logging and urbanization. We must act, and to that end, the Garden Club of New Jersey will be offering, during my 2021-2023 term, six \$1000 grants to GCNJ affiliated garden clubs that sponsor a project focusing on the planting of trees. It is my hope that we can increase awareness about the importance of trees to humans, wildlife and our planet.

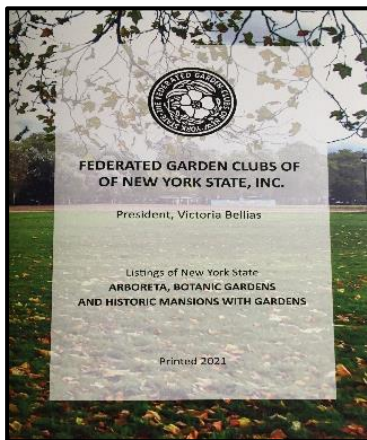

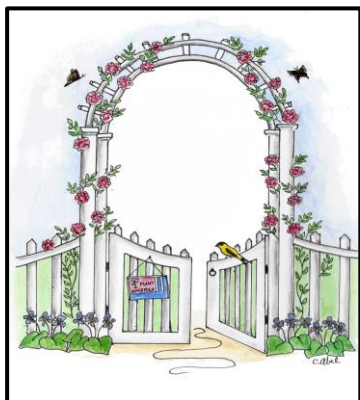

NGC Flower Show Schools Committee

The NGC Flower Show Schools Committee continues its efforts to accommodate the Flower Show Judges who were unable to meet the requirements for refreshing during the past year when few if any flower shows were held. Please note: any judge may attend a symposium for credit in 2021 and 2022 regardless of the number of exhibiting and judging credits acquired. No credits will be required for your attendance at your next refresher this year or next year. You get a free ride! The only stipulation is that Accredited Judges and Accredited Life Judges must take and pass the point scoring exams. Accredited Master Judges must attend all sessions: Allied topic, main topic including practice point scoring for both Horticulture and Design portions. The credits you accumulate this year and next will count towards the following refresher whenever you chose to refresh again within three years.

The National Gardener magazine is no longer being printed but is available online on the NGC website. Anyone who requests it may have it sent to his/her e-mail box free of charge. Contact NGC HQ and give

them your e-mail address. You may then print any part or the entire booklet for your use.

NGC is offering a revised stimulus package under the heading of "A Fresh Look at Flower Shows." It is available to any club who has not had a recent show or is hesitant to hold a flower show. It offers guidelines and information about how to plan a show. It also suggests contacting the local judges council for mentoring help for the planning committee. National Park Restores Toxic Dump Site Back to Nature

In 1985, The Cuyahoga Valley National Park Service in Northeastern Ohio bought the Krejci Dump site which operated as a salvage yard and waste disposal facility from the 1940's to 1980, thinking they had acquired an old junkyard. The following year a person collecting bottles on the site became ill along with several park rangers who would complain of headaches, rashes, and odors. The Park Service soon found contamination across 47 acres that posed a threat to human health and the environment.

After investigation and testing of the site between 1986 and 1987, many toxic substances were found including paints, pesticides, and industrial sludge - polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), benzene, arsenic, dioxin, heavy metals, and other carcinogens. Many major corporations were discovered to have disposed of industrial waste at the site including Ford Motor Company, Chrysler, General Motors, 3M, Chevron and others. The Park partnered with the US and Ohio Environmental Protection Agencies and closed the site to the public in 1986. Because of the

extent of the contamination, this site qualified for cleanup under the Superfund Program.

The multi-decade cleanup process consisted of removal of the leaking drums that contained the toxic waste, along with the rest of the dump's non-hazardous contents. The leaking drums contaminated the soil and the dirt had to be removed from depths ranging from 12 inches to 25 feet. By August 2012, 371,000 tons of contaminated material had been removed from the site.

In the decades-long cleanup effort, the Park Service worked with Ford Motor Company, the lead corporation involved in the cleanup, to recontour and revegetate the site with native grasses and wildflowers, reestablish natural wetlands and restore wildlife habitat. The National Park Service's goal was to restore the site to natural conditions consistent with surrounding National Park habitat and remove the restrictions to public access.

As of December 2020, \$50 million was paid by the responsible parties to remove the toxins and restore the property. In May 2021, the former dump site opened to park visitors for the first time since it was closed to the public in 1986. Acting Park Superintendent Lisa Petit said "Together, we have completely removed one of the most toxic Superfund sites in the National Park System and made it safe for the public to enjoy." A thirty-five year effort!

Gardens in Delaware

During the past 2 years, Delaware Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. has sponsored the creation and restoration of 2 gardens. Plant America has been our inspiration.

Our organization has created a perennial garden to welcome visitors to the Delaware Archives and Heritage Park in Dove *Coreopsis*, *Salvia*, *Echinacea*, *Rudbeckia*, Shasta daisies, phlox, English lavender, painted ferns, *Hosta*, *Gaillardia*, *Mondarda*, *Achillea*, oakleaf Hydrangea, and *Liriope*. Soft touch compact hollies anchor the 3 corners of the triangular garden. A total of 95 plants were installed. An irrigation system waters the garden and mulch limits the amount of weeds. Additional fall perennials will be added in September.



In April, volunteers began working on the Butterfly/ Native Plants garden at Brecknock Park. The original garden was installed 20 years ago. It was ready to be restored. Volunteers planted perennials, installed a path through the milkweed garden, weeded the beds, spread mulch, and filled barrel planters with annuals. Colorful signs indicate the milkweed garden. Children can explore the milkweed and visiting butterflies from the winding path. Plant labels throughout the garden identify the various plants. A park Naturalist conducts weekly educational programs in the garden regarding native plants and pollinators. Families who visit the adjacent playground area and pavilion can now wander through the garden and observe nature. Additional plants will be installed in the fall.
