include a variety of native plants in a variety of types of gardens including some of her designs for public spaces, community parks, affordable housing and private residences. Her talk also covered container gardens for decks and patios, mixed border plantings, and sourcing options. Her presentation concluded with a lively question and answer session.

In April, the club expanded its gardening knowledge by holding a program on gardening in a small green space that is created in a transparent container. Member Linda Levitt gave a demonstration on how to properly plant a terrarium including tools, suitable plant material, containers and design.

And at the FGCNYS's 100th Anniversary and Gala held in May, the club received a commendation citation for 95 years of annual NGC flower shows.
