Garden club member Triona Fristch demonstrated 'cyanotypes' which combines the art of dying fresh plant material to create printed fabrics. This process includes the use of the sun to transfer the image of plant material to 'dye' pretreated fabric. The attendees were treated to what seemed like magic to watch the fabric when placed in the sun outdoors as it changed color leaving behind the

image of the plant material. Triona also gave a tutorial on how to preserve fresh plant material by drying.

# **GUILDERLAND GARDEN CLUB**

ALBANY COUNTY by Maureen McNamra and John Haluska

Our August meeting was held at the Emma Treadwell Nature Center in Thatcher Park. The program was a presentation by Marina Dreeben, environmental education intern, NYS Office of Parks and Recreation. Ms. Dreeben gave a presentation on bald eagles followed by a walking/hiking tour to view an eagle's nest near Thompson Lake.

We learned some interesting facts about Bald Eagles, our nation's symbol:

- Once close to extinction due to the use of pesticides (DDT) following World War 2, eagles are now thriving and no longer an endangered species.
- Nests, high in trees, are 6 ft W x 6 ft H. Nests are used during breeding season only. Eagles return to the same nests in December to make necessary repairs for the next breeding season.





- Fish in Thompson's Lake and the Hudson River is the primary food source.
- Eagles are not snow birds! They winter in NY
- Male wing span is 6 feet. Female wing span is 8 feet.

Thompson's Lake in rural Albany County is home to a mated pair of Bald Eagles. Eagles mate for life, breed once a year—hatching two eggs in early Spring. The eaglets remain in the nest for two months until they fledge. By 4 months (mid-to-late August) the fledglings leave the area and wander for 5 years before returning to the area, but do not encroach on other eagles' territory keeping within a 1-6 mile radius.

A short walk to the nest viewing area found no one at home... the fledglings had already left town and the parents were fishing. Better luck next year!

We also learned about other programs that the Nature Center offers throughout the year. This was an enjoyable mini-field trip and so close to our home base!

Additionally, they support many volunteers to keep the trails safe and accessible. Volunteer gardeners have installed butterfly gardens and other native gardens throughout the Preserve. The visit and talk went well and we hope to be back to learn of the Preserve Conservation Program.

Also in October three of our members attended the District Conference Day. We all found the day most inspiring, enjoyable, and informative.

For November we were very thrilled to have Tammy Feuer, one of our members, present a flower arrangement class that resulted in a Thanksgiving Centerpiece for members' homes. For December we will have a Holiday Pot Luck Party with gift exchange and a craft demonstration for a decoration that a member can use for the holidays and/or as a gift to a local nursing home resident.

The club plants and maintains gardens in five public spaces and assists in the maintenances of gardens in the village park and at senior housing.

Other activities include the following:

- Holiday decorating: Members make sprays and garlands to decorate entry signs to the village as well as other public spaces.
- Yearly donation to Penny Pines to reforest areas that have been damaged by fire, floods or other catastrophic events.
- Community Outreach: Donations to Athens Food Pantry and Catskill Women's Shelter.

- Scholarship to a graduating high school student
- Participation in Athens Community Day: Distribution and information regarding clubs' purposes as well as giving small plants to attendees.
- Bake sale held every year on Athens Garage Sale Day. Home baked goods always sell out.
- Holiday Auction held in November. Live Auction-featuring beautiful baskets, homemade baked goods, and many other interesting items. Our talented auctioneer does a masterful job. In addition, there is also a Silent Auction. This is the club's major fundraising event, open to members of all garden clubs as well as the public. It is a wonderful opportunity for holiday gift purchases.
